Sylvia Naamah Louisa Webster was born Dec. 25th, 1842, in Cherry Valley, Ashtabula County, Ohio, being the ninth child in the family of fourteen children born to Francis Clark Webster and his wife Sylvia Belden Webster.

When Louisa was eleven years old her parents followed the tide of emigration westward leaving Cherry Valley, Ohio, on April 7th, 1854, and making the long, tedious journey by barge and emigrant wagon, reaching Wayne township, Lafayette County, Wisconsin, May 3rd, 1854, where she spent the remainder of her life, with the exception of a short time in Warren, Ill.

Those were the pioneer days in Wayne and the family made their home in a one-room log house for nearly a year, when a more comfortable double log house was built.

School privileges were few at that early date. Religion, however, was an active principle in her early home here as church records show that the next month after the family moved to Wayne, a meeting was held in her father's house by the Baptists of the locality to discuss the expediency of organizing a regular Baptist church. And a branch organization was formed which on April 2nd, 1859, was organized into a regular church called the Spafford Baptist church.

On March 16, 1864, she was united in marriage with William J. Black, who after three weeks was called south in his country's service where he died the following summer of disease and was buried in Arlington cemetery at Washington, D. C. On Dec. 29, 1867, she was married to Albert P. Andrews who preceded her to the great beyond on April 1st, 1908.

Although Mrs. Andrews had no children of her own she had a mother's heart and she and Mr. Andrews took into their home one Charlotte Hocking at the age of three and one-half years who received the love of an own child and daughter until her marriage on Dec. 25th, 1890, to Merrill O. Jenkins.

After Mert's death in 1895 the home was again the home of Lottie and her two small children, Albert and Bessie; and since Lottie's death on Dec. 16, 1898, Mrs. Andrews has filled the double duty of mother and grandmother to Bessie who has been her chief thought through her last years, and who has by her tender, loving ministrations helped to ease the suffering of the last five weeks of "Grandma Andrews."

She passed away close to midnight May 1st, 1927, at the age of 84 years, 4 months and six days, at her home in South Wayne where she had resided for the past 35 years. She was the last of her family, but leaves two sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law and numerous nieces and nephews; and her granddaughter Bessie Jenkins, to mourn her passing, besides a host of friends.

Funeral services were conducted from the late home May 4, 1927, and to the Baptist church, with interment in the Eastman cemetery, Rev. W. O. Wilhelmson officiating.
