Jonas Anderegg, 98, Monroe, died Sept. 2, 2006 at Angelus Retirement Community, Monroe.

Jonas was born July 4, 1908 in Hamberg, in the Canton of St. Gallen, Switzerland, the youngest of 10 children born to Jakob and Verena (Reich) Anderegg. He immigrated to the United States in 1927 via a 10-day ship journey and settled in Argyle with his brother Emil.

Jonas worked as a farming hired hand and part-time cheese maker for three years, earning a reputation for hard work and high-quality results. He was a master cheese maker at the Red Rock Cheese Factory from 1930 to 1935, and at the Ole Olson Cheese Factory in rural Blanchardville from 1935 to 1947. His cheese making skill was very well respected in surrounding communities.

He married Bertha Ida Achermann on April 23, 1935 at St. John's United Church of Christ in Monroe with the Rev. Schuh officiating. Jonas and Bertha had a wonderful life together and raised two children. She passed away in 1980. He was also preceded in death by both parents and all nine of his brothers and sisters.

In 1947, Jonas moved to Blanchardville where he and his family owned and operated Anderegg's Tavern until 1958. In 1958, the Anderegg family moved to Monroe where Jonas worked part-time at Baumgartner's and the Eagles until he retired in 1978.

Jonas married Lucille Hefty Walden on Aug. 8, 1981, also at St. John's in Monroe. They had a wonderful "second life" together and were inseparable companions. Both Jonas and Lucille were blessed to have two

long-term and loving relationships during their lives.

Jonas was a member of St. John's United Church of Christ and Loyal Order of the Moose #735, both of Monroe. He was also a long-time supporter of the Historic Cheese Center of Monroe, the Monroe Arts Center, Turner Hall and the Salvation Army. He thoroughly enjoyed time spent with his family and friends, playing euchre and jass regularly, and Green Bay Packers football.
