

was treated for injuries sustained in the accident and was later released, according to the sheriff.

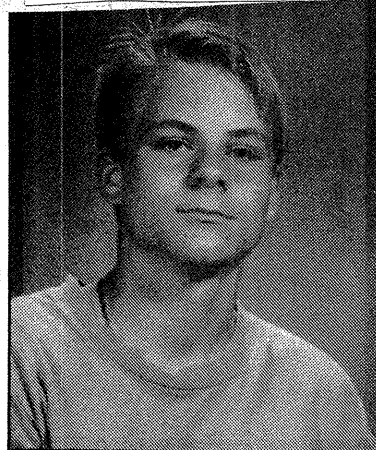
Damage to the pickup truck was extensive. There was no information on whether the teenagers were wearing safety belts or not.

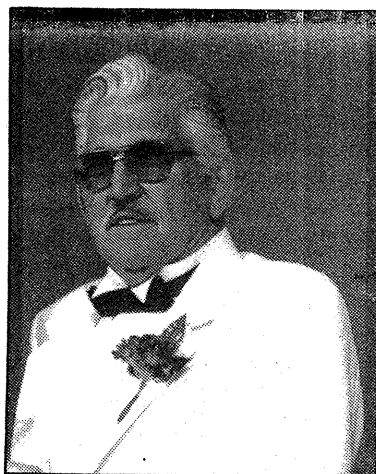
