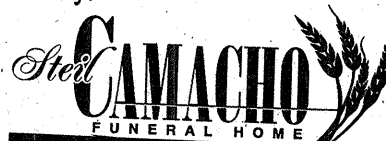
Lauretta was a life-long member of St. Joseph's Catholic Church, Gratiot, and of its Council of Catholic Women.
