Miss Josephine Murray, 89, of Darlington died Tuesday, Feb. 8, 1983 at Darlington Memorial Hospital.

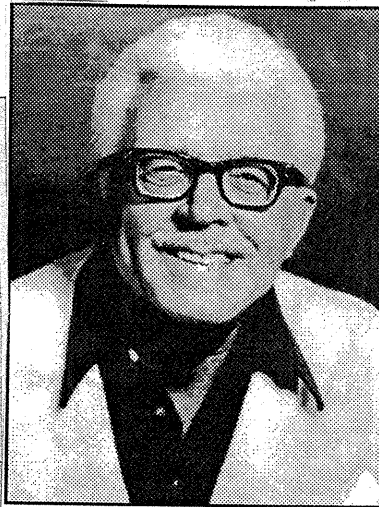
